



Another Day with Moonshine Mike

A few times, our group would have to leave the scenic bottoms for the usual gas stops and a lunch break, then back to the rural roads and fields.













BOOGER... IN THE PAN!

Layne Warford and U-Joint Greasing

by John Zibell



I have a Layne Warford in the 1926 Tudor and have the recommended 85-140 in it. I also have a zerk fitting to be able to pump grease into the U-Joint ball. Recently Bill Robinson and I converted my T from Safety hubs and Rocky brakes to a standard rear axle and Sure stop brakes. On removing the rear end we noticed plenty of grease around the U-Joint. When we pulled the drive shaft I found grease had traveled down the shaft. Not greatly concerned or worried about that. After setting up the brakes and test drive I though it would be a good time to change the gear oil in my Warford. I opened the fill plug and then the drain plug. On opening the drain plug, nothing came out. I stuck a finger in there and discovered grease from the U-joint ball had made it into the Warford. Ever so slowly blobs of grease mixed with oil began emerging from the drain hole. Kind of like cold molasses or the creature from the movie of the same title (The Blob). I let it drain over night and filled with the proper gear oil the next day she shifted fine. Out of concern I call Layne Machine and asked if having grease in there could be a problem. They said it was no issue as long as there is some form of lubricant in there it would be fine. That was a relief. So my advice, if you have a Warford and pump grease into the U-joint ball, change the Warford oil soon after greasing the ball.





Answer to Paula's Trivia submission

Answer to the MODEL T TRIVIA found in the AARP magazine: "While the reason was long thought to be that the color black dried the fastest, company docs say the policy was "solely for efficiency and uniformity," in order words, a second color would slow down and complicate things.

Mark wanted to replace the lug studs on a wire wheel hub. To remove the swedge from the lug studs without damaging the hub, Dan suggested he try a 5/8" hole saw, one without a drill bit installed. Mark found what he needed at a local Ace Hardware.

The hole saw worked like it was designed for this job! Apply a little oil during drilling, and the hole saw will last much longer.

You can also use this method to remove all five studs to remove a hub. Works on front and rear hubs. **THANKS DAN for the great tech tip!**



This is the Milwaukee 5/8" hole saw without a drill bit. Typical hole saws have a drill bit running thru the center.



Adding a little bit of oil during the drilling process will help preserve the hole saw



The hole saw fits directly on the swedge of the lug stud without fear of damaging the hub itself.



All lug studs were easily removed from this hub in a matter of minutes.
