- 6. Once a gift is stolen four times, it is retired from the game.



































He replied "We live there and we own it and we saw all of the wonderful old cars".


What a coincidence and his words just blew me away.....and made my day. Thank you Mr and Mrs Dawson!

#### Trailer Axle Maintenance Tips by Tom Moorehead

Many articles are written in this and other newsletters, discussing pertinent items or repairs to their Model T's. What is not written or discussed is the need to properly maintain the trailers we use to haul our cars for distances we are unwilling or unable to drive to. This is a discussion of such trailer maintenance that raised its ugly head for us just recently.

While heading home, after the Tenn. T tour in September, I was reminded that I had failed to do my biannual repacking of trailer bearings in the self proposed 24 month cycle. And that delay really got my attention.

My co-pilot noted that the trailer was weaving more than it normally does. Usually because of my erratic driving habits, we will see a wiggle from time to time, but not like a wagging dog's tail.

3.5 miles from leaving for an early start home, we were headed back to the motel parking lot for two reasons. One, because the right rear tandem trailer wheel bearing did not want to be friends with said trailer axle. These two components have been together for 15 years and why they have now separated was due to my lack of consoling them as promised. The second reason for the return trip was to beg for possible help from fellow trailer towing participants. Both ideas worked. (Thanks Bill, Hammer, Charlie and Seth)

Parked outside the exit of the motel parking lot meant all who left after we did, had to either stop and ask if there was help needed or just drive by not seeing our dilemma. The helpers arrived and we were successful in getting the jacks and tools and parts needed to facilitate needed repairs. Fortunately, the insistence of the co-pilot to pull over early and check the wiggle, resulted in no real big damage.

So, now that the trailer has returned home, all bearings have been inspected, packed and new seals installed and wheels mounted. We should be good for the next bi-annual routine maintenance schedule.

While I was at it, I inspected the tires, (don't forget the spare tire and wheel Tom), brakes, lighting and wiring, from the hitch to the tail lights of the trailer. The new wiring harness was installed because the co-pilot did not remind the pilot to disconnect the wires from the trailer before driving off to parts

unknown. I did learn that the right turn signal light assembly was not up to snuff, so we got new LED fixtures for both sides. WOO HOO!!! (Thanks E Trailer.com for the new lights, bearings and races. Good folks to deal with). All 4 tires are good and the hitch assembly got lubricated and a new trailer lock was installed. (The old one must have left with the old bearing, as I could not find it anywhere, after the emergency repairs) I guess a lock may not be really needed, but it looks cooler than a rusty old Kentucky nut and bolt through the hole in the hitch latch.

I also need to remember to carry the winch when going to the next tour. The trailer has a mounting bracket ready for the winch to be hooked up. I just need to remember to bring the portable winch along. It does a lot of good having the winch in the garage while on tour. I guess the co-pilot will need to add that to the ever growing pre-loading list. I sure can't seem to remember it!

I guess new wood for the floor on the trailer will be next. Maybe metal would be better? Then, with the deck off, sand blasting and painting the frame would be a good idea.

So, when the co-pilot now asks if the trailer has been checked and serviced, the pilot can confirm with a big 10-4 and not be fibbing!

I wonder how long a trailer could last. This one is 15 years old and is still going strong. I guess in the scheme of things, compared to the car it is towing, it's just a kid hauling grandpa down the road to the next adventure. Being as how the car and trailer are in the same garage, reckon they ever talk about where they have been or what they have seen? I guess that might be another discussion for future issues.

The latest on Darrel's current project- The '24 Tudor project is going slowly but am making headway. The engine in the foreground is ready to have babbitt poured in the mains. This car is a challenge because I just started with a pile of sheet metal. Fordwood is pretty good but it seems to require many modifications to get the metal to fit correctly. Without the precut wood the project wouldn't be feasible. I still don't have the technique down for nailing into the oak on the first try without bending a large percentage of them. ## TENNESSEE T'S MODEL T FORD CLUB MEMBERSHIP REQUIREMENT CAR SAFETY CHECK LIST For Participation in Club Tours

INSURANCE: All members must have proof of current insurance.

FIRE EXTINGUISHER: A standard make portable Underwriters Laboratories approved

B-C extinguisher must be carried in car. It must be readily available.

BRAKES: Brakes must bring the car to a full stop within 25 feet for each 10 miles per

hour speed. Pedal pressure must feel solid. Brake pedal must be less

than 2/3 of maximum travel.

The hand brake travel must be less than 2/3 of maximum and the hand

brake pawl must lock securely.

Working brake lights are recommended.

LIGHTS: All electric lights must be operative.

HORN: All type horns or sounding devices must work.

WINDSHIELD: Safety glass is required in windshields and recommended for other flat glass

windows.

TIRES: All tires must pass visual check for excessive tread wear and cracks.

STEERING: Steering mechanisms must be properly adjusted so movement of steering

wheel exceeding 2 inches actually turns front wheels.

RADIUS ROD: Crankcase studs holding radius rod ball cap must be safety wired.

WIRE WHEELS: Must be in good condition with no broken or loose spokes.

WOOD WHEELS: Must be tight and crack free (spokes & felloes) with no loose wheel nuts or

missing bolts.

SUSPENSION: No broken springs or excessive shackle wear. ENGINE: No excessive fluid leaks – gas, oil or water.

#### WAIVER/CERTIFICATION

In consideration of being a member of the Tennessee T's Model T Ford Club, I certify that:
