Model T stories about the original Natchez Trace Tours.



#### Be Seen From Behind! By Tom Moorehead

Since becoming a Model T owner and driver, I have never been or will probably never be a purist. While I enjoy seeing the "correct" cars and their special place in history, we own drivers and not show cars. Getting from one place or the other safely and in one piece with our friends in the Model T community, is our major concern and purpose.

It has always concerned us that folks will exhibit correctness over possible safety on tours. Following someone that does not have brake lights or turn signals that work, is always a challenge. We always want folks following us, whether T's or modern cars, to know what our intentions will be. Most of the T owners in our club in KY., have adapted to some sort of LED indicators, whether in period correct looking fixtures, or modern type LED's as in this picture. Several followers have expressed appreciation for the high visibility when following LED equipped T's.

We also like the portable and moveable "intention lights" now being sold in the respective Model T magazines. While not as bright and visible from a distance as the DOT approved lights, it still gives the vehicle following a idea of what the vehicle in front of them, what the driver is intending to do.

While the turn signals are a very good idea, some type of "flasher still on", either audible or visual, is an excellent idea. It does no one any good when following a turn signal equipped car, that has been blinking for hours. The hidden turn signals made by Casey Miller in Ohio are our signal of choice. They are well made (lights not included) and are set up for circuitry that allows form the brake lights and turn signals to be operated on the same bulb or light. They have a very audible signal on indicator.

Some of our KY club members use signals purchased from NAPA or on line, that were first developed in the 30's and 40's, that mount on the steering column. These work well, can be set up for 6 or 12 volt, and have a visible flashing indicator. An audible alert can also be added, using a small audible device, available from the big box stores or on line.

While most LED's do not work well on circuits less than 12 volts, an auxiliary, small 12-volt battery can be used for this light circuit only. Or, a converter that allows for a 6-volt battery to put out 12 volts, can be used.

I wish someone would develop a self-cancelling signal for the aftermarket units.

In the end, no matter what device you use or may consider in the future, it is good to be safer with good lights and signals. Your friend behind you will appreciate your efforts. I know we do!

We had 15 cars that drove on Friday and we were able to squeeze all 15 Model T's on the ferry for a single crossing. Ricky had taken careful measurements of the ferry, and he calculated the number of cars that would fit on the boat and only luck provided the club with the exact count that could cross in a single trip. In other words, there was no wait while extra cars were transported by the ferry.

Saturday's Route added 4 cars. The roads were mainly backroads and were traveled at a comfortable pace.

I am happy to report that while a few cars had temporary issues, mostly driver issues, all participants successfully completed the tour.




























