



FORD FIX AND FACTS

Herm Gierow

The Model T engine and transmission assembly is a cumbersome piece of machinery to handle and is inconvenient to store. I have built a small engine stand modeled after the originals which makes both a convenient storage rack and an assemble bench. Since the stand loads the crankcase in the same manner as it is when installed in the car, there is not any unusual stress imposed upon the unit. All construction is of wood and parts are cut from 2 x 4's and are assembled with glue and nails. In making the front mount it is advisable to first drill a hole a little larger than 1 1/2 inches in a short length of 2 x 4 and to then saw through the hole to form the mounting surface. The block should then be sawed to the correct length as indicated in the drawing.

For those individuals who did not get a chance to view the Dunnavant's Mall Show, Dan Shady has built an excellent stand from channel iron for a Model A engine.

For Theton Ogle, participant in the 2019 O2O Rerun, the adventure began well after arriving at the terminus in Seattle. Owner of TinSnips Metal Fabrication in Wincester, Virginia, Theton does intricate metal fabrication and restoration for virtually anything metal. But when it comes to Model T's, he's somewhat of an oddity. He bought his 1917 Touring on an impulse (see my Day 2 O2O video to learn more), but is not a mechanic. He had never been on a tour before, and knew very little about Model T's. When he heard about the O2O Rerun he quickly signed up. With the help of friends Greg Stewart and Neil Kiracofe, he had the ultimate support system. Three weeks before the trip, the car was still just a body on jack stands, but under Greg's tuttiledge, they soon had it ready for the long journey ahead. Neil hauled "Ernie" to New York in a trailer, or more appropriately, 'mobile garage' the threesome had outfitted with everything imaginable.

They travelled cross country with the Hauge clan. Neil followed with his truck and trailer. Initially, Greg did most of the driving and took care of *everything* on the car. Theton eagerly watched, listened, and learned. Part way through the trip, Neil unexpectedly had to return home, so "Ernie" loses his ride back to Virginia. While the rest of us have arranged to ship our cars home, Doug plans to drive his T 'as far as he can' before he has to get back and resume care of his parents in Florida. Theton is excited to continue travelling so the two pair up. They head south through Oregon, drive along the California coast, then turn east through the desert into Nevada.







They mostly stay in state parks and campgrounds. Theton quickly learns how to pitch a tent, start a campfire *without* gasoline, and change a flat tire with the wheel on the car. They enjoy many beautiful sites along the way: the snow capped mountains at 9000 feet, the salty breeze along the coast, the majestic redwoods, and relics of a bygone era.







Nine days and ~1550 miles after leaving Seattle, the two of them arrive in Las Vegas. They enjoy some much needed R&R before Doug prepares his car for shipment and catches a flight home.

He meets up with some motorcyclists camping nearby, and they give him a mascot, he now calls "Bert."







In Mississippi, he meets up with fellow O2O rerun participants Kirk and Wayne. They dine at Jonnie's in Tupelo, sitting in Elvis' booth, then camp together at Davis Lake just off the Natchez Trace Parkway. The next morning after servicing the car, he heads north on the Trace, crossing the river up and back again to pick up Tennessee, then heads towards us in Alabama.



Theton arrives just before heavy storms hit. We enjoy hearing about his travels...he says it is just dumb luck that he has made it this far. He decides to lay out a second day with us to avoid the bad weather brewing to the east, so we visit the Space & Rocket Center. He leaves early the next morning and by nightfall he's camping in Georgia. He then heads on a winding path through SC to NC, camping just outside Asheville.



The route for the 2019 O2O Rerun took us through thirteen states, and those that participated thought that was an impressive accomplishment. Theton has surpassed all of us having hit every state in the South but Florida. He says saving the Sunshine State for another adventure. His mentors Greg Stewart and Doug Hauge are so proud of what he has done on his own. It's awesome!








As I'm putting the closing words on this, I receive a text that Theton is now somewhere in Kentucky. His adventure continues... Go! Theton! Go!

Basically, the unit clamps onto the exhaust manifold, then it gets loaded with food, some water is added to the cooker. Then, the Model T gets driven, which allows the manifold to heat the food until it gets cooked.

The particular cooker on the left was recently purchased by **Elaine Vechorik.**

Elaine was disappointed, because when the new cooker arrived, the top lacked the logo like the older units, so, she used her artistic talents and screen-printing experience and applied the above logo to it. She also added the 2 food holding pans to keep the food out of the water. The air filter was made by her husband Vech. He made the filter from parts used on a BMW motorcycle.

Ingredients

- 2 Tablespoons Dijon Mustard
- 1 Tablespoon honey
- 1 Tablespoon brown sugar
- 4 croissants split
- 8 slices swiss cheese
- Pound deli ham any flavor you like and you might not end up using the whole pound, depends on how thick you like your sandwiches

Instructions

- 1. Mix the mustard, honey and brown sugar together.
- 2. Spread the honey mustard mixture on each side of the four split croissants.
- Place a slice of swiss on each half of the croissants.
- 4. Top the bottom half of each croissant with however much ham you like.
- 5. Place two halves back together.
- 6. Wrap in foil.
- 7. Place in fridge for later.
- 8. Place in a Manifold Cooker and ride around.

I got a call from George Akin a few days ago asking if I could help out a fellow Model T'er. Of course, I said I would. He gave me his contact information and I gave him a call. His name was Kenneth.

Kenneth was an interesting fellow. He was traveling from Georgia across country. Along with his two riding companions, a cat and a pet flying squirrel. Traveling in a fully restored 1916 Model T Touring car with a Model T homemade trailer to help carry his stuff.




