


The Not For Sissies Tour Honestly, our team

our team thought we had some pretty tough even had printed bypass routes for those





Pulaski Tn/ Oct 11, 12, &13, 2018

Hosted by myself and David Walker- The roads, the waterholes, and the routes thanks to David- he grew up in the area and backroads and trails are his passion.

In the Summer heat of 2017, the initial routes were run by David and Seth Spratlin in their speedsters. These two were simply exploring some old historical back roads that David has been riding ever since he was a teenager.

Then, in August, 2017, Paul Gierow and I were invited to tag along, not knowing what we were getting ourselves into. When my invitation first came, my response was to avoid the trip with 2 speedsters, especially since I am a "30mph guy" driving my wife's Touring car. But I gave in and David sent me the day's 130-mile route sheet so I could put the turns in my Garmin. They tricked us both into coming along, saying that they would lead the way, and wait for us at each turn. I had never met Paul prior to this drive. He was a friend of David's and he was immediately "assigned by David" to ride with me in the Touring Car. That worked out rather well and I showed Paul how to operate my GoPro camera and he made lots of good footage that day. After about 15 miles of us following, then catching up at turn-time, David and Seth were waiting for us at a turn on a very secluded, one-lane dirt road at a "Y" intersection. Both guys simultaneously said "Y'all go ahead. Lead the way". "But.... I don't know the way", I replied. A smirky reply came from David, "You have the routes on your GPS. Go ahead!" Dang it, I should have known better, but away we went. Paul videoed the rest of this tricky segment. It was too late to turn around. % mile later we went through a long water hole called "Tennessee Quick Sand". Our whole 130-mile day was run in one water hole after another, many creek crossings, rickety bridges, old historical Cherokee trails, stage coach roads, and even a creek called "Grease Creek" where the mud is so greasy that stage coaches would stop and grease their axles along their route (at least that was David's story, anyway).

After we ran the backroads that day someone suggested, "We should make this a club tour". And that is how this Not for Sissies Tour got started.

As we planned and adjusted the routes, our planning team grew. Some were invited, some invited themselves. This was ex-pres Gary Tillstrom's plan- a territorial planning team. A few years ago at a business meeting he issued a map with "zones" lined out so that club tours could be planned by folks who live in specific areas. His plan worked.

Next, on October 14, 2017, we ran the route again. David, Gary, Seth, Ricky, Bill, Dennis, & Blayne all found out about our excursion and came along. We all met up at a country truck stop/café and departed.

(The team alphabetically: Blayne McCafferty, Paul Gierow, The Planks, The Robinsons, The Spratlins, David Walker- road nut who grew up in the area, The Wheats, The Williams'.)

Southern Giles county TN is a sparsely populated area located in the Highland Rim (roller coaster) just North of the Alabama state line. The back roads start on Chicken Creek Rd which is only a couple of miles from the Hampton Inn in Pulaski. Not many of the roads that David planned even had a center line. Naturally, the dirt roads had no lines because the paint won't stick! The <u>disasters</u> began when we got deep into the back country.

I am now going to attempt to list some of the <u>disasters</u> that occurred:

1. First thing, David's speedster wouldn't start on the Saturday we met at the gas station to drive. Bill, Dennis, and Blayne got behind him to push the car off. It worked, however Blayne fell in the process and the car drug him a few feet. It could have been a real disaster.

- 2. Early in the planning it was just 4 guys. David's tailpipe hit the road because David's baling wire broke, so Seth re-wired it. Good fix. Still there last time I looked, too.
- 3. At our first gas stop, David had to add water to his radiator. The folks at the small town, HillTop Store had no way for him to fill his radiator- so he borrowed their shop's coffee pot.



- 4. At the same store, all 4 guys needed a rest stop- BAD!. The restroom had "OUT OF ORDER" on the door- another disaster!
- 5. Then Dennis had a flat tire. Big 'ol nail! Narrow gravel road, on a hill. Uh-oh! What else is going to go wrong today? Ricky got down to jack the wheel up.



- 6. At the end of that day (Saturday), Ricky informed us that he'd just gotten off the phone with Vandy and that she is on her way to Pulaski. He liked the routes so much that he wanted her to come ride with him the next day because he knew she wouldn't believe his story. I sneaked off without telling Ricky or anyone else to call Suzi and got her on her way to Pulaski. Boy, I didn't want to miss out on this Sunday ride, even if un-invited. Well, our ride was really fun and trouble-free- EXCEPT for the heavy thunderstorm and high winds. We found Ricky and Vandy parked sideways on a one-lane country road, sitting head-into-the-rain and wind in order to (try) and stay dry. They weren't successful.
- 7. Then another day in late Summer, the wives rode along and so did the heavy rains. The first downpour came at lunchtime in Lynnville. Blayne found us an almost abandoned barn to hide in. The barn saved us from high winds and extra heavy rain. Good thing- Nobody got shot.



- 8. 45 minutes later, at the next downpour, the group pulled into the downhill side of an uphill driveway. A couple of drivers (Blayne (aka Barnhound) & Seth) went up the long driveway of an unknown barn. The owner was there trying to keep dry. They asked permission for our group to use the protection of his barn. Being an old car guy himself, he invited us inside his ½ barn and ½ home and he gave us an hourlong tour of his collection until the rain cleared. This was a <u>disaster</u> that wasn't a <u>disaster</u>. We actually had fun.
- 9. The third heavy downpour that same day came and we were in the middle of nowhere, but on a highway, almost back at Pulaski. Suzi and I were leading. I pulled over into a shallow ditch so traffic could go around us, rolled up my windows, looked in my rear view, **No Model Ts behind us**. Where'd they all go? After the rain they caught up but I never heard where they hid. Barn probably.
- 10. Next day, early morning, 3 miles down Chicken Creek Rd a tree laid completely across the road. No way to go around it. No way to hook a strap and tow it away because it was tangled with Poison Ivy and Poison Sumac/Virginia Creeper top-to-bottom. How do we go around it? Had it not been for David we would have gotten lost and maybe created a whole new route. Roads are so scarce that we had to go at least 11 miles out of our way to get back on track. Really!



11. Then, shortly after getting lost, the heaviest downpour of all. No barns anywhere around. Out came the tarps over those who needed them. The group didn't know that Blayne and David had turned around and somehow found a horse barn to hide in. Seth and Hillary were in front of us, and had it not

been for the new Walmart tarp purchased the previous night, they would have gotten soaked. Blayne and his uncle got wet. Real wet. Suzi and I rolled up our windows and videoed the <u>disaster</u>.



Now, quickly, some other problems that we had:

- 12. David takes group way off route, gets everybody "lost". He didn't even know where we were.
- 13. Road signs missing or mis-labeled all over route. This created a "route sheet" nightmare.
- 14. Seth's new fender falls off. His speedster has no trunk, so he finishes the day with a fender on his lap while driving.
- 15. Bill got tricked again- on Estep Hill. David wanted us to go up it. I went, nobody followed. On the way down- "pow-powpow-pow". The guys all laughed. They nicknamed it "backfire hill". Obviously, we scratched this road from the tour.
- 16. Blayne hits a water crossing a little too fast. Water went way over his windshield and into his lap.
- 17. Then, Blayne had a flat tire. Seth and David broke the tire down and found a piece of barbed wire imbedded. Bad luck.
- 18. Then, Blayne's car developed the "death wobble" but a little tightening got it fixed.
- 19. Dennis broke a crank, he had Paul drove him back to the hotel to get his trailer. Then, Dennis had a flat on his his trailer on the way to get his car. 2 disasters in 1.
- 20. Blayne writes "On the one-day trip with Bill, Ricky, Dennis, David, and I, we happened up on a combine that just got done burning up. It was boiling smoke sitting beside the road.

That's enough! We have all thought and laughed of these experiences that happened many times over the last year or so, and each time I smile, and realize how much fun we all had while planning the Not For Sissies Tour.

During the planning stage- the disasters were actually fun.

Myself, I'd do it all over again! Maybe a re-run one day?




Members on the Mend
