
# BOOGER ... IN THE PAN!

**Kim Doty**, a long-standing member of the Tennessee T's, has a friend and neighbor who is a Model T fanatic like us. Many of us know **Steve Phieler** from tours that we have been on. Steve, Kim, and **Tom Moorehead** hang out together and work on each other's cars.

Steve was recently installing a new cam in his Model T, not because he was having mechanical problems, but because he wanted to run a cam with advanced timing for a little extra power. When he removed the front timing cover, he found a nylon timing gear. He saw a "blob" of black substance that appeared to be melted plastic. "Where did that come from?"

Good question. Upon removal of the nylon timing gear, he noticed that the face of the gear a large glob of melted (possibly) plastic, and there were smaller globs of melted plastic around the edges of the gear and the space between the teeth where it's darkest is slightly cupped as if that edge of the gear also got compressed. All other face surfaces are flat.







see the cracked teeth? Poke the + at top of the page- ZOOM in for a good look!

It appears that there was no backlash between the nylon timing gear and the crank gear, or maybe the gear had a wobble. The nylon gear got hot. You can see where it got black between the teeth. Those globs are stuck to the gear, on the sides. The area where it's the darkest has the most distortion to the gear. The area next to the globs is much darker and guessing it got hotter there. That suggests that the gear may have been a bit out of round too. Anyway, it was running too tight.

Can you see the teeth that are cracked? Think of what would have happened had on or two of those teeth broken off. Steve got lucky on this one!

# MAN EDGERES EXERPT EDGERENCE CERTIFICATIONS


When I first acquired our 1915 touring car, I had constant problems with the doors popping open on rough roads. There was a lot of play in each door when closed, even though the striker plates on the door posts were in good shape. Close examination revealed that the sliding bolt of each latch was badly worn where it came in contact with the striker plate. I removed the the latch from the door, and took it apart. The screwdriver is pointing at the wear on the bolt. See photo on right.





I welded the worn spot on the sliding bolt, and then belt sanded and reformed the bolt to a nice sharp edge on that side. Due to the spring pressure on the bolt, there was no way on earth that you could reassemble the hole thing, and get it to stay together long enough to re mount it on the backing plate with the lever, so I drilled through the cover and through the bolt, and tapped the hole in the sliding bolt, in order to keep it all together for the final assembly.








This next photo shows the bolt in the cover, with the springs installed, (with fresh grease) and the slotted screw retains the bolt and springs in the cover.



This photo shows the other side, of the cover with the bolt installed, and the springs installed and greased.







It was very easy to get the assembled cover and bolt back on the backing plate, and I tack welded the cover to the backing plate in 4 places to hold it all together. Then I removed the temporary slotted screw, to release the bolt so it could function.



After rebuilding all the latches this way, I was very pleased with the result. No more door rattles, and the doors no longer pop open, going over bumps!





#### **Tidbits of information about Henry Ford**

Henry Ford continued to dream, scheme, plan, and create. What Ford dreamed of was not merely increased capacity but complete self-sufficiency. He called it vertical integration, and with it he could have control over all aspects of his supply chain. The plant he built along the River Rouge embodied his idea of an integrated operation by including elements of raw materials, production, assembly, and transportation all in a single place. To complete the vertical integration of his empire:

- He purchased a railroad,
- He acquired control of 16 coal mines
- Thousands of acres of timberland in Michigan's upper peninsula came under his control,
- And he built a sawmill,
- He acquired a fleet of Great Lakes freighters to bring ore from his Lake Superior mines,
- And he even purchased and relocated a glassworks manufacturer,
- Finally he even experimented with rubber plantations in South America.


So you no longer had to be a factory line worker to work for Mr. Henry Ford. You could be:

- A railroad engineer or brakeman,
- A coal miner.
- A lumberjack, or a worker in a sawmill,
- A ship's captain or deck hand.
- You could have labored with molten steel or glass,
- Or even been a native of the Amazon rain forest tapping rubber trees and living the American dream in a Ford built village complete with streets laid out in a grid, a school, company store, and Christian church.

Once the massive and complicated Rouge was well underway, Henry Ford established a series of small village factories. His original concept was that these small production facilities would be a place where farmers could supplement their income during the off season by producing components for Ford automobiles. Known today as the Village Industries, these facilities were also an opportunity for Ford to experiment with water power. In the end the Village Industries became an opportunity for Ford to experiment with various production methods and specialized workforces.

Employment opportunities were opened up for women, the blind, and physically disabled veterans. These groups were given employment opportunities through Ford's programs that they would not have had elsewhere. The Village Industries thus became a model open employment as well as for the modern incubator or start up business.


