

Don't Leave Home without It—Planning and Packing for a Model T Jaunt by Ken and Joyce Swan

In addition to the infamous credit cards, there are certain other articles that one should consider a <u>must</u> when traveling in a T---even in the "neighborhood".

This subject is primarily for the benefit of newcomers to the Model T world. As Certified VRM's (Veteran Roadside Mechanics), we feel qualified to recommend the articles and procedures mentioned hereafter as experiences often learned the hard way. Those of you who have already earned your VRM certification may wish to add valued bits of information that perhaps we have overlooked.

It is assumed that the Model T is in proper and reasonable running condition to attain the desired, anticipated trip. This is not a discourse on the maintenance and care of the model T, but for the benefit of the Model T occupants, for a successful and enjoyable trip. To attain an objective, we have found certain invaluable accessories a "must have" for any trip, short or long, and will try to list them, not necessarily in the order of importance.

First and foremost, a <u>full</u> tank of gas. Remember a Model T runs off the top side of a gas tank just as easily as it does off the bottom side, with potential for greater distance. This particularly applies to veteran drivers such as yours truly (one of the coauthors), Gary Tillstrom, Tom Rowe, Ben Hardeman, and Lynn Cook (remember Lynn is the one that likes to go the extra mile before refilling). A general rule of thumb that we have adopted is every other pit stop or potty break be a topping off period for the gas tank. This ritual may vary depending on coffee, cokes, kidney problems, medication, etc.. You be the judge of that, but a model T will not run on an empty gas tank.

Always carry copious amounts of tools. Including a jack, a tire pump, hot or cold patching, and tire irons, spare tire, and spreader for split rims. Extra oil should be part of the cache and, in some climate conditions, an extra gallon of water for the radiator. Include a wheel puller for your car (either wire wheel puller or wood spoke hub puller).

<u>Always</u>, <u>always</u> carry drinking water. A non-perishable snack should be planned and kept aboard. We cannot overstress the importance of carrying water on even the shortest trips—even short trips have been known to escalate into longer trips for various reasons. This will be mostly accentuated and emphasized in July and August on 100 degree days.

A drop cloth, approximately 2 foot by 4 foot, will prove very, very useful for those times when one has to venture underneath the well oiled machine This of course leads to the obvious recommendation of hand cleaner and wiping cloths.

Since characteristics of each car are different, one must learn to provide ancillary parts, such as spark plugs, at least one extra coil (for those running on coils), points and or rotor (for those running on dist*!%@!*), an extra timer, and an assortment of gaskets. Radiator hoses and clamps will come in handy to avert Murphy's Law. A short tow rope or chain may prove to be more than just a convenience at times. Also include duct tape, electrician's tape, fuses, and short pieces of electrical wiring.

Safety aid items, such as a flare, scotch block or chocks, caution signs of some sort, flashlight, disposable camera, and a FIRE EXTINGUISHER.

Personal aid (comfort) items: In addition to side curtains, include extra jackets and headwear, raincoats, a blanket (a nice item for taking a short nap under a shade tree), funeral parlor fan, gloves, chapstick, mosquito repellent, sunscreen, and FIRST AID KIT.

REMOVING BROKEN OFF SPARK PLUGS - Darrel Carter

This is an easy way to remove broken off spark plugs from an old head. Just weld an old half inch bolt to whatever is left of the spark plug and it easily comes right out.


Advancing Valve Timing

I have often heard that Ford had the valve timing for the T model late and that the gear was off from optimum by ½ tooth. Some folks advocate advancing the cam by a full tooth (which is too much) and then open the tappet clearance up by something in the order of .035 to take some of that advance back out. They say the engine will make lots of noise but will run better.

After buying a Tom Carnegie camshaft I decided to email Tom and ask him if he sold a special gear to run this cam at optimum. He told me he didn't and that he just drilled new dowel pin holes in the cam gear and made his own mark on it.

I made a drilling jig from a worn out gear, a piece of shaft turned and pressed in the gear and some drill guides. When done, it allows everything to take place 7.5 degrees sooner than stock.

I plan to put this in my 27, as it is slightly anemic as it stands. I'll let you know



Model T's to Olar

The parade was held on the main highway which runs through town. The local police stopped traffic while more than 25 Model T's drove slowly along the parade route where they were greeted by an enthusiastic crowd

The town of Olar, SC is located midway between Augusta, GA and Charleston, SC. It was established in the late 1800's when the Southern Railroad came through and developed the town along the railroad line. It was named for "Olar" the daughter of Mr. Richard Morris who gave land to the railroad.

About 1890 Mr. Corey F. Rizer moved his business to Olar. Rizer became the largest merchant and businessman in the interior of South Carolina. He owned general merchandise and farm supply stores, livery stables, and banks. In 1913, Rizer entered the auto business and in 1920 announced that the "Rizer Auto Company of Olar" would handle Ford products exclusively.

About this time, Henry Ford was looking to expand production, Rizer loaned Ford \$25,000. Rizer was given the exclusive Ford franchise for five counties. Shortly thereafter, a train load of Model T's was delivered to Rizer. The train was over ½ mile long with 64 box cars each containing four Model T's. The 256 cars were delivered in March and the last one was sold in November.

To recognize the contributions of Rizer and Ford, the town of Olar held its first "Model T's to Olar" festival in October 2003. A car show and parade were the main events.

On October 30,2005, Glenn Storck and I drove 60 miles in our 1921 Touring Car "Old Blue" to the second Model T's to Olar festival. It was an exciting ride due to heavy fog. We hadn't realized how foggy it was until we were well on our way. We kept thinking that the fog would burn off but it didn't. The route is a good Model T ride—flat and not a lot of traffic. Except for the logging trucks which we were sure would not see our tiny tail light in the fog and would come up behind us and run us over. But we made it, the weather cleared and it was a beautiful day.


