



FOR ENCLOSED CAR OWNERS ONLY

I've have owned 2 different enclosed '27 Model T Tudors for several years. Suzi and I really like riding in the enclosed cars and Suzi especially like them because her hair stays stable. The whole time I've owned them I've had to listen to "I can't turn the door handle!" My reply always was "Well, it's almost 100 years old".

Back in November I finally made her happy. Here's how, fellows:

- 1. Roll the window down- all the way.
- 2. Shine a flashlight down inside the door/window channel and twist the door handle.
- 3. Eyeball down inside the door and visually locate the 2 moving parts of the mechanicanism.
- 4. Get a long clear straw from Taco Bell and lower the bottom end onto each of the 2 moving parts of the mechanism.
- 5. Using an oil can with chainsaw bar oil, squirt a few drops down the upper end of the straw. Overnight these drops will find the moving parts (if the straw was correctly located)
